Website Toolkit

With the [Website Toolkit](#), IW:LEARN is able to provide your project the support it needs for developing a dynamic content management system. Websites developed using the Toolkit incorporate usability, accessibility and metadata standards, and will be linked through IW:LEARN and UNEP's distributed discovery mechanism. The resulting network will allow access to high quality data and information and ensure dissemination to a broader community of stakeholders.

GeoNode toolkit

[The IW:LEARN Spatial Lab](#) aims to provide a customizable mapping of the GEF International Waters (IW) portfolio and provide a visualization of studies, reports and intervention results on the various transboundary water basins pulled together with the help of the GEF IW projects, partner organizations and authoritative sources and other contributors.

The IW:LEARN Spatial Lab provides a central service for sharing and discovering geodata. The platform lets users upload, manage, and browse and visualize data, and export public data in reusable formats.

This is made possible through GeoNode which is an open source platform for sharing geospatial data and maps.

GeoNode is primarily a social platform, and thus a primary component of any GeoNode instance is the user account. We encourage you to [create your account](#) and begin your visualization experience!

LEARNING EXCHANGE SERVICE CENTRE (LESC)

OUR MARKETPLACE FOR LEARNING

The Learning Exchange Service Centre (LESC) is a mechanism for mobilising the more external network of IW:LEARN Partners to respond to GEF IW Project demands, coordinating Partner-driven learning activities, and providing means for GEF IW Projects to find their way to the various organizations.

Last year, you should have been contacted by Jérôme Koundouno (Jerome.KOUNDOUNO@iucn.org) from the IUCN requesting you to fill out a “Project Needs” template. This is to help facilitate the development of our Learning Exchange Service Centre (LESC).

Using the information you have provided, as well as the opportunities for learning and training by our partners, we will work with GRID-Arendal to create an online “marketplace” where you can search for training or workshop activities in the areas which are beneficial to your project.

TWINNING

PAIRING YOU WITH THE RIGHT PROJECT

We are committed to helping you find the correct partners to team up with for vital learning exchanges. This year we have several goals:

- To establish 4 more long-term twinning pairs between freshwater-freshwater or freshwater-marine, focusing on those that interconnect or address common issues;
- To receive 2 ad-hoc twinning exchanges based on proposals received by the IW portfolio;
- To link GEF IW projects with non-GEF projects through our partners such as the International River Foundation, The Nature Conservancy and The International Commission for the Protection of the Danube River.

Twinning on Sex-Disaggregated Water Data

The IW:LEARN gender partnership with the United Nations World Water Assessment Programme (WWAP) of UNESCO, seeks to enhance gender equality in water programs through activities that support gender mainstreaming.

To promote gender mainstreaming via Twinning Exchanges, IW:LEARN invites your GEF IW project to work with WWAP to broker exchange of experience on mainstreaming approaches.

Twinning with the International River Foundation (IRF)

Here at IW:LEARN we are working to help leverage the International River Foundation’s existing twinning program and their Riverprize Alumni to introduce external experience into our International Waters portfolio of projects.

Potential twinning exchange topics offered by IRF include:

- Coordination and collaboration between stakeholder groups, including public private partnerships
- Development of integrated catchment management plans and adaptive frameworks
- Integrated water management including river restoration, rehabilitation and protection initiatives and achieving water, energy and food security
- Achieving balance between sustainable river basin management and economic development
- Building community education and awareness
- Implementation of clean-up projects, greening, and resettlement programs
- Community involvement and participation, including the role of women in river basin management
- Improvement of transboundary partnerships and river basin management
- Enhancement of water governance through policy development and enactment of laws
- Monitoring and evaluation for the sustainable use of water and management of catchments including data analysis, synthesis and report cards
- Utilisation of water markets and ecosystem services in managing river basins
- Building environmental advocacy and campaigning
- Reconciliation of the multiple uses of water to achieve water security

- Alternative livelihood projects (e.g. bamboo propagation)
- Climate resilience and adaptation (infrastructure and community resilience)

Furthermore, the IRF is arranging the International River symposium (IRS) which will be held in Sydney on 14-18 October 2018 and the theme is “Embracing Innovation” for our rivers.

While we will be announcing a clear structure for the twinning with IRF at a later date, if you are interested in any of the above topics and want to enter into an exchange with the IRF, do not hesitate to let me know.
